

Religious Education

Our religious education program for children offers classes for children from pre-school through grade 5. In addition, we have a youth group for junior and senior high students (grades 6 through 12).

We follow a three-year curriculum: one year of instruction in the principles of Judaism and Christianity, one year of Unitarian Universalism, and one year on World Religions. This rotation is repeated every three years, providing a broad educational experience for students as they move through the program.

Nursery care is provided for all worship services and many other events.
