Greetings!

Dear Friends,

There have been many moments in my life where I have found myself so amazingly grateful to be part of community. And not just any community, but one that felt especially vibrant and loving, playfully and creative, resilient and responsive. There've been moments I encountered I still remember. Moments I've spent my life trying to recreate.

Sometimes these moments came in the midst of an unbearably difficult time. Like, when I was seven and my parents divorced. And it felt like my siblings and I got passed from one family in the church to another. And we felt ourselves surrounded with kids our age, other sets of caring adults. Food. I learned from these moments that I could feel my feelings — even the feelings that were uncomfortable; that were sometimes discouraged at home. I could share my confusion and people didn't walk away or try to change the subject. I felt accepted, even while I struggled with a moment that felt unacceptable.

A few of these community experiences were in my teen years where I was just figuring out who I was. Where I was trying out new ways of expressing myself. Taking risks. Discovering emerging or latent parts of myself. Times where I was petrified of being rejected or unwanted. Times I didn't always understand my responsibilities in relationship. Or my needs. But I was held in an intentional space where peers and elders promised to show up. And did. They understood I would make mistakes. I got honest and direct feedback. I also got a lot of acceptance and allowance and encouragement to help me learn and grow.

I remember a church that taught me about being a leader; making decisions that affected others; that taught me how to summon empathy, look for other people's needs; understand that there was sometimes a difference between my intention and the impact I had; how to apologize when I hurt people by making my need to connect with people more clear than my need to be right.

I've also been in communities that have felt unsatisfying. And unsupportive. Where I felt like I had to tiptoe on terrain built out of sensitivities. Where I walked on landmines of pet peeves or self-interest.

And, of course, I've experienced life in our modern-day consumer society where everything we do is a transaction. Where it's hard to feel like I amounted to anything more than just another commodity.

Looking back on those communities that infused me with gratitude, I realized that they were all put together deliberately. There was a complex weaving together of intentionality. Agreements based on high standards of kindness, acceptance, understanding and forgiveness. Commitment was huge. And resilience. Looking back, the best parts of who I am were discovered in such places.

Now, Mission Peak community is wanting to explore what kind of intentionality it takes to become one of those communities – or, at least, deepen the parts of our commitment that already makes us one. This Sunday, after the Worship Service, the Committee on Ministry is going to lead us through a conversation about what ingredients are essential for communities moving into this territory of beloved community. We will talk about what the community does as well as what each person does to help us get there.

Please join us for this heart opening conversation. I look forward to seeing you there.

Interfaith Thanksgiving Service moves online


