Greetings!

As I write this, COVID is raging. People are being turned away from hospitals near where I was born because they are beyond capacity. White nationalists are storming the White House. To say I hoped more love and understanding would prevail is an understatement.

Like many of you, I am glad to be saying goodbye to 2020. But it's naïve to think we can shut the door on conflict and hurt and pain. The genie is out of that bottle. And though I am not God and cannot waive my arms and fix the problems of the world, neither can I ignore my part in resolving them.



This Sunday we are going to continue our conversations about covenant. Covenant is really just an intentional promise to hold in mind a vision of the impact Love could have if we focused it in a particular place – with particular people. To partner with those people to understand exactly what that love looks like in action and to promise, encourage and support one another to embody those actions and make real the love we know is possible.

In November, we had a conversation about what our version of 'Beloved' community looks like. We described or imagined such versions. Though each was unique, among all the versions described there was a resonance. From that resonance, The Committee on Ministry distilled what we heard into **Ten Emergent Properties** – The qualities that make Beloved Community what it is for us, in this moment.

We are calling everyone back into conversation after service this Sunday because we want you to explore these emergent properties more, to narrow in on what of those properties would most uniquely and productively resonate as the core of our covenant.

We also explored over 60 different UU Covenants from congregations similar to us, extracted the individual statements, boiled them down and cleaned them up. There is a theory that says that if you took all the statements from all UU covenants and removed redundancy, you would wind up with around 23 Unique Covenant Statements (at least, that's what it was in our case). It's our work to figure out which of those statements will help us bring to life the emergent properties of our unique Beloved Community.

Please plan to be with us this Sunday. There is a place for you in this community. There is room for your heart in this conversation.



Both books take the form of letters from black parents to their children. Each book is less than 200 pages and they are available in physical book, Kindle, and audio book form from Amazon; Breathe is available in physical book form from the UUA Book and Gift Shop; and both books are available in audiobook format from **bookshop.org**. Both books are also available in all formats from the Alameda County Library. If you are interested in participating please purchase the

books and start reading ASAP. If you need help acquiring the books please let Jen King know.

Jen King will be leading the discussion of both books as one of our upcoming Adult RE offerings. We have scheduled four 2 hour discussion sessions (although there is a good chance they won't run the entire 2 hours). The discussion sessions will be from 1:00-3:00 pm via Zoom on January 17 & 31 and February 14 & 21. If you would like to sign up for the class, please just let Jen know and get the books and start reading. We all need another Zoom meeting like we need a hole in the head, but these books are important and worth reading and discussing and each interaction, even via Zoom, brings us into closer fellowship as a congregation.

Meditation & Dharma

The Winter quarter of Adult Ed classes is upon us, and I wanted to remind everyone of the "Meditation and Dharma" offering on the 2nd and 4th Thursdays of each month from 7 to 9 PM. The first class will be next week on January14th.

This quarter is a great time to join since we will be starting a book from the beginning. "Training in Compassion," by Norman Fischer, is commentary by a Zen priest about a Tibetan mind-training practice which uses a set of slogans to communicate ways to cultivate compassion and resilience in your life. It's not as obtuse as that last sentence makes it seem; this book was so enjoyed and it prompted such good dialogue that it was am unanimous decision by those in the class last year to restart the discussion. (I can also point you to the list of people if you want a second opinion.)

While we are isolating, the format is to do individual meditation for the first half-hour followed by a discussion by Zoom between 7:30 and 9. Beginning meditation instruction will be offered the first few classes from 7 to 7:30 by prearrangement, so that's not a hurdle. 
UUA Article II Study Commission
