

Greetings!

My name is Allysson McDonald, and I am a member of the board (on July 14 I will no longer be president, but step into the lighter role as past-president). Many of you know that I am Canadian, so Thursday, Canada Day, has special significance.



As a Canadian immigrant who has lived in the US since 1989 the chronologically close holidays of Canada Day (July 1) and Independence Day are always special. We usually celebrate the 4th of July with friends, but I actually became WAY more patriotic (to Canada) after moving here (absence makes the heart grow fonder?), especially after having children and wanting to impart some of my culture and national pride. I wear RED on Canada day, sometimes have a party, always fly the maple leaf flag, and try to eat something “Canadian”.

But Canada Day this year will be different. You may have read about the recent discoveries of hundreds of unmarked graves at former residential schools in Canada. Here's a [link](#) to a recent NYT article. Canada Day has become a controversial topic in my Canadians in the US facebook group. Is it right to celebrate a country that perpetrated such wrongs so soon after their discovery, while the First Nations (what indigenous “tribes” are called in Canada) are in mourning? Some have suggested wearing orange instead of red this year, the official color of the new September Canadian statutory holiday - National Day of Truth and Reconciliation. The moderators of one group have requested that members not post “Happy” Canada Day this year.

I was torn - I had already picked out one of my Canadian T-shirts (red) to wear on Thursday. I was going to ask my sons to wear their “Grown in the US with Canadian Roots” shirts, too. But I think this year I will forgo all that. I will still try to eat something “Canadian” on Canada Day, but in writing this article I have finally concluded that this year I will be wearing orange. No one here will know why, only my family might question why I am not wearing my “Made in Canada and Aged to Perfection” shirt. But I will know. I will know.

Being a patriot for me does not require blind faith and acceptance. It means holding fast to

principles and aspirations that define my country for me. I am saddened and angered that children were not only kidnapped and forced into an education system that was designed to strip their culture from them, not only did they suffer from abuse and a loss of family connection and the PTSD and other psychological harms, but they were killed - in the name of civilization, in MY name! This is the hypocrisy that both our nations were built on. And it is far from being ancient history - the school in Saskatchewan, near where I grew up, was operating into the 1990's. I see Canada taking ownership of what was done. Apologies have been issued. For that I am proud. But I will wear orange this year, in memory, in mourning, for the children.

So I will not wish you a happy Canada Day, as I might have. I won't wish you a happy Independence Day either. I will ask you to be a true patriot - to hold your country/ies to the values they stand for. I do ask you to remember the children.

Democracy

Democracy is sacred to Unitarian Universalists. Full democracy must both protect the majority from an oppressive minority and protect minorities from an oppressive majority - no easy task. And democracy is not just something to be established, it must be effectively maintained. Our July 4th service will explore the processes of democracy, their historical roots, and our present needs.

the patio outside Cole Hall. Our sound system works well inside, outside and over Zoom. Our worship leaders will either be inside Cole Hall or use Zoom to connect to the service in Cole Hall in future weeks.

Attendees should be masked inside and outside of Cole Hall during the service. We allow worship leaders, associates, and other service participants to be unmasked while speaking if they voluntarily disclose they are vaccinated and are 10ft apart from others who are not fully vaccinated.

[Protect Amah Mutsun Sacred Grounds from Proposed Santa Clara Quarry](#) – Juristac (Huris-tak) lies at the heart of the ancestral lands of the Amah Mutsun Tribal Band near Gilroy, CA. For thousands of years, Mutsun ancestors lived and held sacred ceremonies at this location in the southern foothills of the Santa Cruz Mountains, above the confluence of the Pajaro and San Benito rivers. The cultural landscape encompassing Juristac is today known as the Sargent Ranch. An investor group based in San Diego purchased the land at a bankruptcy auction and is currently seeking to develop a 320-acre open pit sand and gravel mining operation on the property. The Amah Mutsun vehemently opposes the proposed mining project, and is asking the public to join them in standing for the protection of their sacred grounds.
