Greetings!

"It is not the strongest or the most intelligent who will survive but those who can best manage change."— Charles Darwin

I want to talk about change. Mostly, because there's an awful lot of it right now. And it's hard. And scary.

My choice of leaving engineering and entering seminary wasn't because I was dying for change. It was because I was seeing everything around me changing. And I could feel *it* changing *me*. I felt two urges: to double down, defend who I was and protect what I had. Or be part of the change I wanted to see.



The late 80s and 90s presented fissures of change (which are even more extreme today). Thousands died of AIDS while others watched in condemnation rather than compassion. Black men were being lost in the prison-industrial complex few questions. LGBTQ folks took up the playbook of the freedom riders and gender warriors asking exactly what 'liberty and freedom for all' really meant.

I looked for clarity by reading Unitarian history. I remember reading about Francis David who became the champion for religious tolerance – challenging the oppression and changing as he did so. David changed from his Catholic outlook, to Lutheran, to Calvinist and finally to being the court preacher for the Unitarians. He pushed for change – often and hard. He helped the Unitarians move from oppressed to influential. But it came to a head for even the liberal Unitarians when he asked for more change than they preferred. This month marks the 442nd year that they locked him in the Tower of Deva where he would eventually die. The charge for which he was convicted: 'innovation.'

I see now I wasn't dying for change – at least not like Francis David. But I also recognized that others were dying without change. Yes, the world was indeed changing me. I just wanted to be changing *it* as well.

I invite you to be the rare part of privilege that invites and incites change. Knowing it will change us in the process. It is the only way to change the world.

Safety Policy for Hybrid Services in Cole Hall

When we have volunteers to support a hybrid service we will provide three ways to attend the service — via Zoom, sitting inside Cole Hall, or sitting on the patio outside Cole Hall. Our worship leaders will either be inside Cole Hall or use Zoom to connect to the service in Cole Hall

Attendees should be masked inside and outside of Cole Hall during the service. Because it is becoming apparent that vaccinated people can still spread the disease to others, we strongly encourage those in contact with children, and unvaccinated or immunocompromised adults to attend services outside or via Zoom. We allow worship leaders, associates, and other service participants to be unmasked while speaking if they voluntarily disclose they are vaccinated and are 10ft apart from others who are not fully vaccinated.

how we are trying to keep us all safe as we gather together again, please read it.
We expect to continue to monitor what is safe and make changes as needed.

We also have other board policies related to Covid-19 in section 18 of the board policies document, which is also in the "About->Congregational Documents" section of the website. The outdoor event guidelines in section 18.2 will control how we would be able to have food or drinks outside after the service, or for special events. In recent years, UUs have made a commitment to reconsider the cultural and colonial foundations of this tradition, in counsel and relationship with First Nations and Indigenous communities. The Harvest the Power program and Thanksgiving Reframed worship service last year were a significant milestone in this effort, and the work of truth-telling, cultural healing, and transformation must continue. This virtual worship service, on Nov. 18th at 4:30 PT / 5:30 MT / 6:30 CT / 7:30 ET, intentionally crafted by centering Indigeous people and cultures, is an invitation to come together in that spirit. This service is presented by many Indigenous Unitarian Universalists in collaboration with Relations from local Tribal Communities, the UU Ministry for Earth & Side With Love.


Please join us in person for an outdoor interfaith candlelight vigil to memorialize members of the homeless community we lost this year.
