Greetings!

I'm sick. It's a painful, debilitating sickness and I worry it might be terminal. I've felt these symptoms and know they've gone unheeded for a long time. At least I know from where my sickness comes and can trace it back to the many sources.

It comes from supermarkets in Buffalo, NY. and Boulder, Co.; a railyard in San Jose; a birthday party in Colorado Springs; a convenience store in Springfield, MO; a Synagogue in Pittsburgh; churches in Sutherland Springs, TX, Charleston, S.C. and a U.U. church in Knoxville, TN; a Walmart in El Paso; a FedEx warehouse in Indianapolis; a music festival in Las Vegas; massage parlors in Atlanta; a Waffle House in Nashville; a gay nightclub in Orlando; a movie theater in Aurora, CO.



Yesterday, nineteen children were murdered in Uvalde, TX. Elementary school students attending their last week of class before summer vacation. The loss of these children, the devastation of their families, the trauma carried forth by survivors, and the implicit curriculum in the school are things which will never be erased – and all are part of the sickness. What makes it seem terminal is when the social stethoscope is applied, and we notice that distinct rattles of Sandy Hook Elementary School can be heard; as well as Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School, Oxford High School, Santa Fe High School, Columbine High School. Robb Elementary School is, tragically, nothing new. Just the latest statistic on this horrific list of shame.

What makes me fear this is terminal is that the shame which should have been an instant wake up call to [dis]arms, has become only the latest boundary we have sped past. We are all frogs in water coming to a boil.

The rest of the world sees us as insane. And the fact that we continue to call these events 'unexpected tragedies' when they are both predictable and preventable, means the rest of the world is probably right. Each news story of innocents killed has revealed politicians throwing their hands up and judges siding with the constitutional right to shoot rather than civilians right NOT to be shot. It is soul numbing to witness. The sickness I've come down

with is the feeling that society is telling my soul to acquiesce to something no healthy, sane person would ever accept.

Our congressional and judicial systems have followed the trance-like dance of legislators who are so deep into the pockets of gun lobbyists that we are all in a conga-line toward moral abyss. <u>HERE</u> are some of the dozens of things that can be done. Refusal of legislators to do anything – much less EVERYTHING – to save innocent lives is evidence that the money and power they receive from soul-less gun lobbyists is more important than their responsibility to protect our safety and civil liberties.

Please <u>Call your Senators</u>! <u>Call your U.S. Representatives</u>! Take action. In a just society, power doesn't belong to gun manufacturers, lobbyists, politicians, judges or even the lost individuals who seek a trigger to the powerlessness they feel. Power belongs to the people who learn to speak and act and work together for a better future.


Note we use PayPal for this and they charge us around 3%.

Safety Policy for Hybrid Services in Cole Hall

Attendees should be masked inside and outside of Cole Hall during the service. We encourage people to wear N95 (or equivalent)which are more effective than cloth or surgical masks. We have such masks available in Cole Hall on Sunday mornings. We encourage people to only come inside Cole Hall if fully vaccinated and boosted. Because vaccinated people can still spread the disease to others, we strongly encourage those in contact with unvaccinated or immunocompromised people to attend services outside or via Zoom.

The **board Safety Policy on how we allow services in Cole Hall** is in the "**About-Congregational Documents**" section of the mpuuc.org web site. If you wonder how we are trying to keep us all safe as we gather together again, please read it. We expect to continue to monitor what is safe and make changes as needed.

We also have other board policies related to Covid-19 in section 18 of the board policies document, which is also in the "About->Congregational Documents" section of the website. The outdoor event guidelines in section 18.2 will control how we would be able to have food or drinks outside after the service, or for special events. Proposed Actions of Immediate Witness for 2022

The UUA makes two types of social witness statements which are voted on at General Assembly (GA): Statements of Conscience (SOCs),

which arise from Congregational Study/Action Issues (CSAIS), and Actions of Immediate Witness (AIWs). There are 6 proposed AIW's and no new CSAI's this year. An AIW is a statement about a significant action, event, or development in the world that necessitates immediate engagement and action among UU member congregations and groups. They express the conscience and carry the authority of the GA delegates. Multi-Platform General Assembly: Choose Your Platform

In-person Registration is required for all live GA events and programming taking place in Portland, Oregon. In-person registration includes access to virtual content available on the GA app, powered by Whova. In-person registration is the same process for delegates and non-delegates; delegates may register before or after determining their delegate status. General Assembly registration is required for all in-person participants, including in-person delegates. <u>Register now!</u>

Full Virtual Registration is required for access to virtual GA programming, including workshops, worship services, the Ware Lecture, featured speakers, Opening and Closing celebrations, exhibits, entertainment, and networking. Virtual GA programming will be streamed on the GA app, powered by Whova. Delegates will use the GA Delegate

Platform for discussion and voting during General Sessions. Virtual registration is the same process for delegates and non-delegates; delegates may register before or after determining their delegate status. **Register starting March 1**

Business-only Virtual Registration provides access to the GA Delegate Platform for discussion and voting during General Sessions. Payment is not required but a donation to offset production and platform costs is suggested. Business-only registrants will access to delegate chat rooms but will not have access to GA programming, the GA app, networking opportunities, or the exhibit hall. GA delegates are strongly encouraged to register as Full Virtual Registrants. <u>Register starting March 1</u>
