

Dear Sandra,

"I am sorry. Forgive me' were the words many of the apartheid perpetrators originally cited. But what the victims - the elder South African tribespeople – heard through their translator was 'Ndicela uxolo,' was so much more.

I'm retelling a story from Mpho Tutu van Furth, daughter of Bishop Desmond Tutu. Like her father, Mpho is an Anglican priest. But she was stripped of her post when she married a woman. She is also the author of 'The Book of Forgiving' which addresses her work in South Africa's Truth and Reconciliation process.

Mpho points out that in western culture it is common to wrap an apology with the language of individuality. Confessing apologies are all about MY mistakes. Thus, "forgive me" is all about ME.



But what the tribes' people heard – 'Ndicela uxolo' – actually translates as, "I ask for peace." It is an ubuntu apology. It is about WE. Not ME.

Ubuntu is an African (Nguni Bantu) term that roughly translates as 'I am because we are.' In other words, 'my individuality can only emerge when I work to repair our solidarity.' The reconciliation that honors YOU, heals ME and restores US.

I was raised UU in a different culture. My mother was Jewish. She taught me about the days of awe – the days between Rosh Hashanah (the Jewish New Year) and Yom Kippur (the day of Atonement). It is the most holy time in the Jewish year where we're called, first, to repair any estrangement before embarking on a new enterprise. Such repair, in the Jewish world, is holy work. Our best WE is not possible until the best ME and the best YOU each set down burdens of anger, guilt, hurt, shame, suspicion and defensiveness to become an unencumbered US.

In MPUUC's covenant, our first aspiration is about trust.

We aspire to the highest levels of trust.
To be trustworthy, we will show up,
do what we say we will do
and communicate with kindness.
To practice trust, we will focus on the best within people.

Each one of us is inherently worthy. And each one of us makes mistakes. But mistakes never cancel worth. Recognizing each other's worth keeps us from discounting ourselves and each other. And it presents US with our best path forward.

### Water Communion

This Sunday we will celebrate our annual ingathering ritual of Water Communion. We're going to explore the origins of this practice and its effort to help each person connect their individual essence to the great collective of our shared purpose. If you are with us in Cole Hall – or if you're with us from afar – we want you to think about two things:

- 1. Have / bring a container with a little water representing some value you were taught in your origins; and
- 2. Consider what worthy cause you would like your value to contribute toward

As we pour water into the communion bowl we will share our story. Example:

'Mercy, I got from my father in Scranton, NJ, goes to refugees in the immigration system.'

## **Safety Policy for Hybrid Services in Cole Hall**

Attendees should be masked inside and outside of Cole Hall during the service. We encourage people to wear N95 masks (or equivalent) which are more effective than cloth or surgical masks. We have such masks available in Cole Hall on Sunday mornings. We encourage people to only come inside Cole Hall if fully vaccinated and boosted. Because vaccinated people can still spread the disease to others, we strongly encourage those in contact with unvaccinated or immunocompromised people to attend services outside or via Zoom.

The board Safety Policy on how we allow services in Cole Hall is in the "AboutCongregational Documents" section of the mpuuc.org web site. If you wonder how we are trying to keep us all safe as we gather together again, please read it. We expect to continue to monitor what is safe and make changes as needed.

We also have other board policies related to Covid-19 in section 18 of the board policies document, which is also in the "About->Congregational Documents" section of the website. The outdoor event guidelines in section 18.2 will control how we would be able to have food or drinks outside after the service, or for special events. Many thanks to all of you who took the time to complete our recent survey regarding Covid-19 and how it affects attendance at MPUUC. We know it is easy to feel "oversurveyed," but especially when so many folks are attending virtually, it is the easiest way for us to attempt to contact and hear from our members.

Due to our reading of current scientific thought and the preferences of our responding members, it appears that we do not need to make any significant changes to our Covid-19 policies. Our Zoom services are a popular choice for many, and we expect they will continue as long as we have the technical and personnel support we need to make them possible. We have cut down the wording of our pre-service safety announcement in order to make it more concise, but we are continuing to require attendees to be masked, keeping doors open as much as possible, and requiring that eating and drinking be done outside Cole Hall.


