As your treasurer, I've been mulling over what it means to serve on our board, and that has me thinking about stewardship. I have been asking friends what they think of when they hear the word "stewardship" and their responses have been enlightening, gratifying, and thought provoking.



The consensus is that stewardship often entails protecting the property or assets of a group, and yet it's bigger than simply "fiduciary responsibility." Here are some of the comments I've collected:

* historically, a steward was a servant who brought the wine

* one dictionary definition of a steward is: a person morally responsible for the careful use of money, time, talents, or other resources, especially with respect to the principles or needs of a community or group

* stewardship means taking care of what is sacred and most dear in our hearts, that which we see as precious

* we are stewards of our Earth, which means we should care for it, not have dominion over it

* to steward well requires love, generosity of spirit, and a mindset of abundance rather than of poverty, insecurity, or scarcity

* we are each stewards for the divine light within, for our own life essence and all the gifts we have been given

* stewardship requires trust, conversation, and a vision for the future

* stewardship requires both good boundaries and flexibility

* practicing our Mission Peak covenants can help us be better stewards

What do you think of, when you think of stewardship? What are the precious things in your life that you steward? What helps you be a better, more visionary, loving steward?

What role do each of us play in the stewardship of our Beloved Community? Let's continue this conversation! I'd love to hear what you think.



Safety Policy for Hybrid Services in Cole Hall

Attendees should be masked inside and outside of Cole Hall during the service. We encourage people to wear N95 masks (or equivalent) which are more effective than cloth or surgical masks. We have such masks available in Cole Hall on Sunday mornings. We encourage people to only come inside Cole Hall if fully vaccinated and boosted. Because vaccinated people can still spread the disease to others, we strongly encourage those in contact with unvaccinated or immunocompromised people to attend services outside or via Zoom.

The **board Safety Policy on how we allow services in Cole Hall** is in the "**About-Congregational Documents**" section of the mpuuc.org web site. If you wonder how we are trying to keep us all safe as we gather together again, please read it. We expect to continue to monitor what is safe and make changes as needed.

We also have other board policies related to Covid-19 in section 18 of the board policies document, which is also in the "About->Congregational Documents" section of the website. The outdoor event guidelines in section 18.2 will control how we would be able to have food or drinks outside after the service, or for special events. COVID Survey Results

Many thanks to all of you who took the time to complete our recent survey regarding Covid-19 and how it affects attendance at MPUUC. We know it is easy to feel "over-surveyed," but especially when so many folks are attending virtually, it is the easiest way for us to attempt to contact and hear from our members.

Due to our reading of current scientific thought and the preferences of our responding members, it appears that we do not need to make any significant changes to our Covid-19 policies. Our Zoom services are a popular choice for many, and we expect they will continue as long as we have the technical and personnel support we need to make them possible. We have cut down the wording of our pre-service safety announcement in order to make it more concise, but we are continuing to require attendees to be masked, keeping doors open as much as possible, and requiring that eating and drinking be done outside Cole Hall.

Beyond Fracking Belief, A Permits

Race Is On!

The Inflation Reduction Act of 2022 has kicked off a permits race. We must stop the Mountain Valley **Pipeline** (MVP) for fracked gas. What is the MVP? See <u>here</u>. This is the first battle on the permit fast-tracking policy front. If the deal Senator Manchin (D-WV) set up slides through, it sets a terrible precedent. So this is an all-hands effort.



Appalachia is leading the way, calling from its hilltops and hollers to all allies, as well as other sacrifice zones such as Alaska, Gulf Coast communities, the Midwest, and more. They are asking UUs to show solidarity and give support to those at risk due to this legislation by attending a **mobilization in D.C. on September 8th** for advocacy, witness, or both.

<u>Protect Juristac Sacred Grounds</u> Support the Amah Mutsun Tribal Band as they prepare for a historic rally in downtown San Jose to protect their sacred grounds, Juristac.



Located near Gilroy, Juristac is now a potential site for a 403-acre sand and gravel quarry that would devastate this place of cultural and spiritual importance to the tribe, eliminate important open space habitat for native species, and disrupt a critical migration corridor for wildlife. The Amah Mutsun Tribal Band and allies like SURJ San Mateo are opposed to the plan and asking local communities to <u>sign a petition</u>, write letters, and join them at a rally.
