Message from an Occasional Attendee

Probably more of you know my wife, Beth, since she is a worship associate and participates in other activities. Beth and I started attending

Safety Policy for Hybrid Services in Cole Hall

Attendees should be masked inside and outside of Cole Hall during the service. We encourage people to wear N95 masks (or equivalent) which are more effective than cloth or surgical masks. We have such masks available in Cole Hall on Sunday mornings. We encourage people to only come inside Cole Hall if fully vaccinated and boosted. Because vaccinated people can still spread the disease to others, we strongly encourage those in contact with unvaccinated or immunocompromised people to attend services outside or via Zoom.

The board Safety Policy on how we allow services in Cole Hall is in the "AboutCongregational Documents" section of the mpuuc.org web site. If you wonder how we are trying to keep us all safe as we gather together again, please read it. We expect to continue to monitor what is safe and make changes as needed.

We also have other board policies related to Covid-19 in section 18 of the board policies document, which is also in the "About->Congregational Documents" section of the website. The outdoor event guidelines in section 18.2 will control how we would be able to have food or drinks outside after the service, or for special events. Anti-Racism Anti-Oppression Committee (ARO) Recommendations

SURJ (Show up for Racial Justice

CURB, a Black-led statewide coalition of more than 80 organizations, is working to reduce the number of people in prisons and jails, reduce the number of prisons and jails, and shift



spending away from incarceration—and toward things that actually keep people safe, such as housing, healthcare, and jobs. As leaders of the #CloseCAPrisons campaign, CURB co-coordinates five statewide workgroups that are pushing demands for California to close 10 prisons in 5 years and engage in a just transition away from prisons and towards a safer, healthier California.

USE YOUR VOICE

Join Californians United for a Responsible Budget's (CURB) #EyeCandyCampaign. California's prisons are racist, toxic, and harmful. In California, 68% of people sentenced to Life Without Parole are Black or Latinx, and 80% are people of color. It can be hard to talk to loved ones and neighbors about the need to #CloseCAPrisons, but these eyecatching graphics are a great place to start! Over the next 5 weeks, CURB will be posting Eye Candy graphics that highlight an issue that's exacerbated by CA Prisons and what we can imagine for our communities once prisons are dismantled. Use this toolkit to access and share the graphics on your own social media, and amplify CURB's Instagram and Twitter posts.

LSPC organizes communities impacted by the criminal justice system and advocates to

release incarcerated people, to restore human and civil rights, and to reunify families and communities. They build public awareness of structural racism in policing, the courts, and the prison system, and advance racial and gender justice in all their work. LSPC has been focused on getting bills passed, helping the communities they serve, and continuing their vision of restoring civil and human rights, including through programs such as Re-entry Training, Community Organizing, Computer Basic Trainings, Quest for Democracy, Community Giveback, FriendsGiving, and Welcome Back Home Dinner.

Support Pomo Land Back! Jackson Demonstration State Forest is the largest state forest in California at nearly 50,000 acres. It is located in the unceded ancestral Northern Pomo and Coast Yuki territory of the Coyote Valley Band of Pomo Indians. Since its inception in 1947, the State has primarily managed this forest to cut it for profit, not preserve it. Ongoing logging, road-building, and herbicide use have seriously damaged the ancestral cultural resources of the Tribe and devastated this beautiful, bio-diverse ecosystem of redwoods. Please sign the Coalition to Save Jackson State Forest's petition demanding EQUAL co-management of State lands between Tribes and the State. You can also donate to the Tribe's legal strategy here.

Board briefs from December 2022 MPUUC Board meeting.

The board met on Tuesday, December 13, 2022:

Approved November minutes and attachments to be posted on website.



- Approved \$2000 increase in the Worship budget through the rest of the 2022-23 fiscal year. This
 item is to cover honoraria for non-MPUUC speakers when Rev. Greg is away. This information
 will also be noted for operations budget planning for the next fiscal year.
- Discussed the vision for the upcoming Canvass with Valerie Stewart, Canvass Chair, who attended this part of the meeting.
- Approved Valerie Stewart, Kathi Bayne, and Michelle Wallace as MPUUC delegates to the 2023 Pacific Western Region (PWR) Regional Assembly.
- Received update that Paul Clifford has agreed to fill a vacancy on the Committee on Ministry.
- Approved \$1000 from the PPP account (federal Paycheck Protection Program loan was forgiven) for payment to Kristi Wagner, Financial Consultant, for assistance with the financial transition from the old system, ICON, to the new system, Quickbooks.
- Continued updating wording on Board policies. Sections are being reviewed and updated each month so the entire document can be adopted in its entirety when all sections are completed.
