

Warm greetings, everyone!

I'm Don Ramie, leader of the Operational Support Team. We're a group who take turns arriving a little early on Sunday mornings to prepare for the service. We have three duties:

- Set Up. Chairs, cushions, tables and signs are put out. The chalice, candle and the bell to start the service are also set up. After the service, all these things are returned to their storage places.
- Aesthetics. The lectern and the rest of the area on the dais (raised platform) are decorated anew each week.
- 3. Greeter. One of our members stands near the front door and says "hello" to people as they arrive and offers them an order of service. The greeter also brings the Joys and Concerns book up to the worship leader during the service when people have finished writing in it.



As usual, service has its rewards. For me, I always get more than I give to our wonderful congregation and its outreach. I have never been good at organizing people or leading them. Now I am learning some skills in this area and it becomes easier and more fulfilling. I have usually worked alone in my work as an artist, now I'm becoming more comfortable with asking people to help.

Enjoy our Sunday services, and rest assured it will all be ready to go and lovely. And, of course, anyone who wants to try some of these tasks is welcomed. No long-range commitment required, and if you can't make a Sunday, old leader Don will take care of it!

Safety Policy for Hybrid Services in Cole Hall

Attendees should be masked inside and outside of Cole Hall during the service. We encourage people to wear N95 masks (or equivalent) which are more effective than cloth or surgical masks. We have such masks available in Cole Hall on Sunday mornings. We encourage people to only come inside Cole Hall if fully vaccinated and boosted. Because vaccinated people can still spread the disease to others, we strongly encourage those in contact with unvaccinated or immunocompromised people to attend services outside or via Zoom.

The **board Safety Policy on how we allow services in Cole Hall** is in the "**About- >Congregational Documents**" section of the mpuuc.org web site. If you wonder how we are trying to keep us all safe as we gather together again, please read it. We expect to continue to monitor what is safe and make changes as needed.

We also have other board policies related to Covid-19 in section 18 of the board policies document, which is also in the "About->Congregational Documents" section of the website. The outdoor event guidelines in section 18.2 will control how we would be able to have food or drinks outside after the service, or for special events. Welcoming Each Other

Hello from your Membership Committee!

Feeling a sense of community is an important reason why many people have become involved in this congregation. Hybrid services have been wonderful in allowing all of us to be together, those that don't live in the area, those who live in the area but are unable to attend in person, and those in Cole Hall. The small disadvantage to hybrid services is it can be more challenging for us to feel connected to each other like we did when everyone was in Cole Hall.

Though not required, we ask those attending via zoom to turn on their cameras. Having our cameras on helps those in Cole Hall feel connected to those on Zoom. It helps those on Zoom feel more connected to each other. Last but not least, it helps visitors to get a better sense of who we are by seeing live faces and not blank screens.

After the Board Welcome, we will have a chance for in-person and remote attendees to wave at each other, which is called Welcoming Each Other. We experienced this last month with the Methodists when we had our joint service with them and liked the idea. Though this is something new and may need adjustments, it is our hope that this small act of greeting each other will help us feel a stronger sense of love and connection.


