

Dear Sandra,

Mission Peak is in a crossroads moment. If you care about this congregation, it's time to pay attention and act. We are emerging from a global pandemic where we — appropriately — responded with extraordinary caution to save lives. We tried our best to stay connected from a distance. Our caution likely saved lives. But it cost us. It cost us members. It cost us leadership. It meant that fewer people had to do more to get even part way to what we once did easily at full strength.

The Board is – right now – putting together a proposed budget for you to vote on. The budget we will likely include two new staff members. Two new AMAZING staff members. Ariel Smith-lyer and Von Bringhurst are inspired, energetic, creative, skillful and visionary leaders. They are catalysts. They have exactly the gifts to make the most of the volunteers who show up to support them. They do not have magical powers to do for us what we will NOT do for ourselves.



In many ways we had a very impressive stewardship campaign this year. Over half of those who made a pledge, expanded their commitment and increased their pledge. If you were one of these people, THANK YOU!!! Your commitment is essential right now.

But these financial commitments cannot be given in lieu of personal and volunteer commitments. We cannot hire people to be the community for us. NOW is the time to show up. Use this moment to take advantage of this incredible staff support for the simple reason, if we can't increase membership and leadership, these staff will not be here a year from now (partly because we won't be able to afford them and partly because they will find ways their talents can make a bigger difference elsewhere).

Right now, we are in a radical experiment for our survival – both within and beyond the congregation. And the biggest factor determining success is showing up. How we commit to showing up now, post-pandemic, is every bit as important as how we committed to distancing at the pandemic's onset.

I commend to you three things:

1. Show up in the congregation. If you live at a distance, show up for services on line

and turn your camera on. Put your pronouns in (which announces to gender-fluid / queer, trans folks that it is safe for them to show up). If you are local, show up in person and let people see your smiling face.

2. Say 'yes' to leadership. Say 'yes' to the dynamic collaboration that Ariel, Von, the Board and I are proposing. Community engagement is exactly the antidote that authoritarian movements fear (Authoritarianism thrives on malaise and anxiety).

 And say 'yes' to diversity in all its forms. Allysson McDonald has been doing some amazing work organizing with a coalition of black leaders in Milpitas to host a THRIVING JUNETEENTH CELEBRATION ON SATURDAY JUNE 17. READ HOW WE CAN BE PART OF IT.

Evidence abounds that the US and the world are experiencing authoritarian suppression of diversity and liberal values. This congregation, like diversity itself, cannot be assumed to survive. Survival comes from showing up and bringing our commitment for diverse communities with us.



JUSTICE CORNER

Biden Eyeing The Border

The U.S. should comprehensively reform its immigration laws, policies, and practices, to honor the humanity of migrants and would-be migrants



Washington, DC - Last week on April 27, 2023, the Biden Administration announced "sweeping new actions to manage regional migration" (U.S. Dept. of State) ahead of May 11, 2023 when Title 42 is set to end as part of the expiration of the national COVID-19 public health emergency (DHS Fact Sheet, and HHS OIG flexibilities Ending).

Unitarian Universalists for Social Justice (UUSJ) has been monitoring conditions at the southern border and our government's responses. UUSJ has been advocating for the values of Unitarian Universalists to promote more just and equitable national policies that reflect the worth and dignity of every person. We believe some of the actions announced do not help and will cause harm.

We urge the Administration to drop some of the aspects which make access to asylum more burdensome and unavailable and only implement, in a thoughtful way, the positive aspects of this plan.

"UUSJ believes that the U.S. must; 1) comprehensively reform its immigration laws, policies, and practices, to establish systems that, among other things, honor the humanity of migrants and would-be migrants, respectfully and efficiently considers their requests for asylum and other protections and benefits; and, 2) provide accessible pathways for citizenship to people who want to raise families and fully participate in our republic. We understand this to be consistent with our faith's call to "respect the inherent worth and dignity of every person," and that includes that "no human being is illegal," said **Pablo DeJesús, Executive Director, UUSJ**.

Meetings With House Staff On Democracy

In the last several weeks, the Democracy Action Team has been meeting with House staffers to determine what democracy legislation can move forward. The team had an informative conversation with three offices:

- Rep. James McGovern (D-MA), Ranking Member, House Committee on Rules, cosponsor of H.J. Res 13 and End Dark Money Act
- Rep. Adam Schiff (D-CA), Member of the Jan. 6 Commission, sponsor of H.J. Res 13, and cosponsor of the End Dark Money Act
- Rep. Brian Fitzpatrick (R-PA), Co-Chair of the Problem Solvers Caucus and sponsor of the CLEAN Elections Act and the Restoring Faith in Elections Act

UUSJ had useful conversations with each office about the current situation in the House. Staff still consider it very early in this session of Congress and, at least for now, the Freedom Caucus members are driving what is being discussed.

Cosgrove was fired for violating policy and procedures by using deadly force in the killing of Breonna Taylor on March 13, 2020; he entered Taylor's home with a no-knock warrant obtained with falsified statements and killed the 26-year-old unarmed, innocent Black woman. The Carroll County community wants to feel safe—demand that Sheriff Miller rescind his hiring of Cosgrove by adding your name to this letter.
