

Dear Sandra,

We're in May. And, since I was raised by two teachers, and I am married to a teacher, and I'm in my 25th year of ministry, my frame of reference for time passing has always been - not the calendar year or the seasons but the school (church) year. And, one of the things that leaders in school / church year do in May is reports.

Whether it's report cards or annual reports, it basically amounts to 'evaluating' how we did against what we were asked to do. You may be someone who hears the word, 'evaluation' and get nervous, associating such a process with judgment. There is a strong tendency to want to avoid such processes to avoid the harshness of criticism, shame, or guilt. Why not just skip all that, we might ask.

There's a saying that states, 'If you don't care where you're going, any path will do.' But I think what



distinguishes people in school – and in church – is that we're people who DO care where we're going. It matters to us that we make the most of our lives, our community, and our world. It matters that we follow through on our aspirations. Comparing our efforts against our ideals are where we discover meaning being made. So, I like to think of this process as 'e-value-ating.' A soul-full check-in about how powerful, effective, and resilient our values have been – especially Love and Justice – at making a difference.

If you are one of the people helping to fill out a report at this time, I hope you'll summon the theme of the month – courage – and explore some important questions:
Did we start with values, ideals, aspirations we wished to enact?

- Did we have needed resources equipment, time, funding, people to make the difference we wanted to make?
- How did we do against the challenges presented?

Asking and answering these questions is the heart of courageous learning. And we are all courageous learners. It's what makes us better as people and as a community. It is what makes more Love and Justice possible.

Biden Eyeing The Border

The U.S. should comprehensively reform its immigration laws, policies, and practices, to honor the humanity of migrants and would-be migrants



Washington, DC - Last week on April 27, 2023, the Biden Administration announced "sweeping new actions to manage regional migration" (<u>U.S. Dept. of State</u>) ahead of May 11, 2023 when Title 42 is set to end as part of the expiration of the national COVID-19 public health emergency (<u>DHS Fact Sheet</u>, and <u>HHS OIG flexibilities Ending</u>).

Unitarian Universalists for Social Justice (UUSJ) has been monitoring conditions at the southern border and our government's responses. UUSJ has been advocating for the values of Unitarian Universalists to promote more just and equitable national policies that reflect the worth and dignity of every person. We believe some of the actions announced do not help and will cause harm.

We urge the Administration to drop some of the aspects which make access to asylum more burdensome and unavailable and only implement, in a thoughtful way, the positive aspects of this plan.

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"UUSJ believes that the U.S. must; 1) comprehensively reform its immigration laws, policies, and practices, to establish systems that, among other things, honor the humanity of migrants and would-be migrants, respectfully and efficiently considers their requests for asylum and other protections and benefits; and, 2) provide accessible pathways for citizenship to people who want to raise families and fully participate in our republic. We understand this to be consistent with our faith's call to "respect the inherent worth and

dignity of every person," and that includes that "no human being is illegal," said **Pablo DeJesús, Executive Director, UUSJ**.

Meetings With House Staff On Democracy

In the last several weeks, the Democracy Action Team has been meeting with House staffers to determine what democracy legislation can move forward. The team had an informative conversation with three offices:

• Rep. James McGovern (D-MA), Ranking Member, House Committee on Rules, cosponsor of H.J. Res 13 and End Dark Money Act

• Rep. Adam Schiff (D-CA), Member of the Jan. 6 Commission, sponsor of H.J. Res 13, and cosponsor of the End Dark Money Act

• Rep. Brian Fitzpatrick (R-PA), Co-Chair of the Problem Solvers Caucus and sponsor of the CLEAN Elections Act and the Restoring Faith in Elections Act

UUSJ had useful conversations with each office about the current situation in the House. Staff still consider it very early in this session of Congress and, at least for now, the Freedom Caucus members are driving what is being discussed.

Cosgrove was fired for violating policy and procedures by using deadly force in the killing of Breonna Taylor on March 13, 2020; he entered Taylor's home with a no-knock warrant obtained with falsified statements and killed the 26-year-old unarmed, innocent Black woman. The Carroll County community wants to feel safe—demand that Sheriff Miller rescind his hiring of Cosgrove by <u>adding</u> your name to this letter.
