Dear Sandra,

I have received dozens of emails, texts and calls from people I love – many in this congregation – who've heard me share my sabbatical plans to visit Egypt and Israel this November and December. Many who know that my nephew, moved to Jerusalem in August to attend yeshiva have asked about him. I've been very moved by hearing that people are thinking of us. My nephew is safe. And, as of this article, plans for my travel in that region are still in place.



I am Jewish by heritage. I know from extensive family and professional religious study what it means to have your tribe targeted and persecuted. But don't take this to mean I am anti-

Palestinian. I am anti-hate. I oppose terrorism as a manipulative escalation of fear, anger and ignorance – no matter who is behind it. My lifelong dream of visiting the holy land was never to be pro-Israel. Or pro-Christian (which is also part of my spiritual and familial heritage). My dream has been to surrender my indifference. Give up my bystander card. Learn about the pain and struggle on every side when hate is given weapons and tools to be violent.

History is filled with examples of how violence was used ideologically. The Bible – as well as other religious writings are multicultural depictions of hurt people hurting people. But, the upcoming presidential election, the extremism in Congress, and the way billionaires control global media platforms absent of any ethical rigor are all examples of how oppression permeates into political and secular society as well.

My personal belief is that – religious or secular - we cannot stay on the sidelines. We can no longer watch the game. We need to be part of it. And Unitarian Universalism is made for moments such as this. We have too much understanding and too much compassion to remain neutral in such times.

My deepest hope is that during the sabbatical both of us – Mission Peak and myself – will take a hard look at how we want our names to be written into history. And, that when we return together, we will have new ideas of how much more we can do together.

One opportunity is before you in the next couple weeks. On October 29, Mission

Peak will hold a congregational meeting to decide whether we are prepared to make a public statement endorsing the work of the California State Reparations Task Force (as presented on October 1 by Donald Tamaki). This is an opportunity to recognize the ways that hate and discrimination were bolstered by society's commitment to stay silent on the sidelines. We can be the first UU community in California to publicly support the work of the task force, calling our UU family to bring the full measure of our commitment to right relationship.

Thank you for giving this issue your attention. And for giving one another the care and consideration we all need to thrive together.

At the October 1 worship service, Donald Tamaki, spoke about the State of California Reparations Task Force Report. On October 29 our congregation will vote on a statement of support.

To prepare for the vote, we encourage you to read the <u>executive summary</u> of the reparations task force report before the meeting and be present in person or online to vote. <u>Hundreds of organizations</u> including the Tri City Interfaith Council have endorsed the report. JUSTICE CORNER

We're grateful for the courageous advocacy of Rev. Christina Branum-Martin, Rev. Misha Sanders, and all the Unitarian Universalists who are faithfully showing up to put Cop City on the ballot and to demand that the people of Atlanta decide. This morning UUs helped to deliver the over 116,000 petition signatures collected by the Cop City Vote Coalition in support of letting Atlantans decide if they want Cop City.



The City Clerk claims that they are not

"legally obligated to verify signatures" because of the 11th circuit court stay ruling. We join with the Cop City Vote Coalition in calling on the City of Atlanta to honor the signatures and add the Cop City Referendum to the ballot TODAY.

Anti-Racism Anti-Oppression Committee (ARO) Recommendations

In 2009, I moved back to my hometown of 2,500

people in rural South Dakota to be a teacher. That same year, my little sister, who is Native, started kindergarten and was called racist names on the playground by her classmates.

While my sister faced unchecked racist bullies, I was buying classroom supplies and being chastised for talking about race in my middle school classroom. Both of us were unsupported by our school system. Our 100% white school board had been organized into the divide-and-conquer worldview of the far right, believing that honest conversations about race were the problems in our schools, and not the lack of funding we received.

This year, SURJ is launching our first ever school board campaign, "All In for All Students." We've recruited a cohort of 17 teams across the country that are working at the school board level in their local communities, some supporting candidates running for election and others working on issues like fighting for trans kids' rights.



Our first phone bank is this Wednesday at 6 pm ET where we'll be calling other SURJ members to turn them out for this work.
