The countdown to the longest night of the year is on! When this newsletter goes out there will be about two weeks until the Winter Solstice. December is a hard time for sun lovers like me. It doesn't help that there is so little light to read in the news. It's a good time to take care with what we consume, to supplement the diet of our innermost selves. One way to do that is to join the Tri-City Interfaith Council sponsored Winter Solstice Refugia service which I'll be a part of. We're meeting at St. Anne's Episcopal on Friday Dec 22 nd, more details in a post below.

At the Diwali celebration we had last month the kids were offered a bindi to wear, the dot placed between the eyebrows, which I told them was "not a 1st eye, and not a 2nd eye but a 3rd eye- the one that helps you remember to look inside yourself, to listen for your own truth" This particular aspect of Hinduism seems totally



in line with the Unitarian Universalist 4^{th} principle which teaches that we have a right to a free and responsible search for truth and meaning. If I were going to put a bindi on the calendar for the time of the year I most depend on the strength that lies where only my 3^{rd} eye can see, it would be December.

One of the ways I make my way through this sometimes tumultuous, always overbooked month of December is to remember that life doesn't stop at the end of the month, January is right around the corner! This coming January I am looking forward to becoming trained as an OWL (Our Whole Lives) human sexuality teacher for elementary grades. This training will be in-person down in LA and it's possible I can find a room at no-cost to an MPUUC congregant who also wants to receive this training- maybe that's you! I'm also looking forward to a collaboration with Tanya Webster, the DRE at Starr King UU Church (in Hayward) and folks from that congregation, for a day of justice and service work on Martin Luther King Jr Day, **Monday January 15th**. If you are in town that day I hope you'll consider joining us for this multi-congregation collaboration which may involve a march if Hayward decides to offer one, followed by a native plant service project here at Mission Peak.

you'll come to the 2nd annual Cookie Decorating party that the Newstrom family is helping put on. Anti-Racism Anti-Oppression Committee (ARO) Recommendations

SURJ (Show Up for Racial Justice)

Show Up for our Partners' Long Term Vision

Our partners are leading with vision and breaking ground, investing in the space, people, and strategy required to build a humane society that will support their communities to thrive after centuries of racism.

- **TGI Justice Project (TGIJP)** secured a permanent home in San Francisco this year one that will hold their long-term vision of a Black Trans Cultural Center and political home for TGIJP members within the city they helped build.
- Sogorea Te' Land Trust is growing their rematriation work in Lisjan territory, returning to the cultural knowledge and practices that were lost in colonization. In partnership with Movement Generation, 43 acres of land in the unceded Bay Miwok territory of the San Francisco East Bay Area were returned to Indigenous care

- earlier this year.
- Initiate Justice, Ella Baker Center, and Californians United for a Responsible Budget are working strategically on securing long-term change through legislative action. In 2024, our partners will be supporting bills that will help establish polling centers in county jails, allow incarcerated people in California prisons to vote, and engage youth facing restitution in restorative justice, community service, and employment. All this, while steadily working on closing California prisons.





Board briefs from November 2023 MPUUC Board meeting.

The board met on Thursday, November 9, 2023.

- On 11/8/2023, Cole Hall was broken into, but nothing was taken. A police report was made, and repair will be made within 3 weeks.
- At the congregational meeting on 10/29, the congregation approved the endorsement of the California Reparations Task Force after changing the word "study" to "support."
- The Board voted to authorize a transfer of 4 hours of Ariel's extra 9 hours (during the sabbatical) during the month of December to Von to prepare music for the holidays.
- The Board unanimously approved the charter for the Publicity Committee.
- The Publicity/Outreach Committee has placed an ad for MPUUC in *The Tri-City Voice* that will run for 1 year.
- The Board agreed to have the Candle Service on Christmas Eve at 5 p.m.



The next board meeting will be via Zoom on Wednesday, December 13 at 7 pm.
