

## Pacific Western Regional Assembly: Registration Opens January 4! Mark your calendars for April 19-20, 2024!



Gun Violence has been an issue of public health and safety in our nation for many years and it worsened during the pandemic. No other developed nation has as many guns, as much gun violence, or as many gun deaths as the U.S.

LWVFNUC will feature speakers from Brady United Against Gun Violence. Brady is one of America's oldest gun violence prevention organizations, and its history of success goes back decades. Learn facts about gun violence, Brady's programs to reduce gun violence, and what you can do to support sensible change to keep our nation safer.



Kath Tsakalakis is a Brady National Board Member, NorCal Regional Council Co-Chair, and co-leads the San Francisco Brady Chapter. She worked for 20 years in strategy consulting, including two years in South Africa where she survived an armed carjacking. Her understanding of guns from three years in the British Army has turned out to be very relevant to life as an American citizen. Kath finds hope in the overwhelming support from a majority of Americans for background checks on gun sales. She supports Brady "because of the mission, strategic focus on practical initiatives and the can-do approach."



Shikha Hamilton is Vice President of Organizing at Brady and has worked on the issue of gun violence since 2000. She's held various roles with Brady, including Chapter Leader, State Chapter President, and member of the Board of Trustees. Shikha is a licensed attorney in California and Michigan. She uses her skills to support efforts to prevent gun violence and to help others advocate for sensible gun laws. She is most proud of her work in California where she lives and continues to work with local chapters to pass laws that have been instrumental in reducing CA gun deaths by 51%.



Toni Shellen is Past President of the Tri-City Alameda County Brady Chapter and served as a member of the CA Brady Executive Committee for ten years. She is a Bay Area native who earned her degree and teaching credential at San Jose State University and went on to teach elementary school in the Fremont Unified School District. She was a founding member of Pax Christi Fremont, and is a member of the Tri-City Interfaith Council and the League of Women Voters FNUC. Toni believes we must work to end gun violence to leave the world a better and more peaceful place for children today and future generations.




