Dear Sandra,

Over the last year as I have watched my kids Adelaide and Rioghan engage with Children's Chapel, it has been a privilege to watch them continue to display their budding (forgive the pun) sense of fascination with things that grow. We spent a goodly amount of time in the summer and fall (over)watering the flowers and succulents in the beds in front of Cole Hall with the other littles. We picked pretty plums from the garden's encircling fruit trees. We helped to plant a manzanita in a plot envisioned to teem with other California-native flora. Perhaps most exciting, though, the children were able to



bend and twist their way into the tomatoes Valerie had planted, harvesting an abundance to munch and to share with the congregation. Dirt under their fingernails and the fruit's sticky tanginess dribbling all over, they've been abuzz with thoughts to share and questions to pose.

This last year in the garden has certainly provided an excellent vantage of our kids growing (transitively and intransitively). Their (and my) experiencing some aspect of the transformation from seed to plenty forms a significant component of our 'why' in engaging with this community. And, as freelance writer Robert Brault asked: "why try to explain miracles to your kids when you can just have them plant a garden?".

Spring continues to get into full swing and I have wanted to continue to cultivate (I couldn't not) in my kids the child-like tendency to share from a place of bounty. So far we've sown a few rows of carrots, some beets, and some flowers. We've even already seen some little shoots poking through! With Ariel's help ahead of the most recent Parents Night Out, we just put some potatoes in the earth, and yesterday we planted a few new tomato plants, too. If you'd like to help with watering, weeding, or otherwise get your hands in the dirt, please let me know; you are most welcome. My hope is to nurture these plantings towards harvest time, and to have enough to share the joy of them. Maybe that will be after Sunday service at Cole Hall, or maybe that will be somehow with our friends at Sunrise Village. Until then, please join me in

encouraging the children to be patient as they grow; it can feel like a long time until noticeable maturation.


Mistakes and Miracles Book Discussion

Petition to Exonerate the Port Chicago 50

 In 1944, a Navy cargo vessel explosion at a Bay Area port killed hundreds of sailors, most of whom were Black due to the Navy's segregation. When many of the



surviving sailors protested the unsafe working conditions, they were threatened with death and then convicted of mutiny. They have since been recognized as heroes, having sparked the desegregation of the U.S. Navy and the beginnings of the civil rights movement. Sign this petition calling for full exoneration for the Port Chicago 50 to restore honor and justice to their legacies.

SURJ Bay Area's solidarity statement on Justice for Palestine

– Many of us are talking about Palestine, marching to demand an end to the war on Gaza and the West Bank, acting to end the Occupation. This is a good time to remind ourselves why we are acting together and to reread the SURJ BA solidarity statement on Justice for Palestine that was written collectively and released last spring.
