

Dear Sandra,

Hello to my Mission Peak family! My name is Michelle Wallace, and I am a member of the Board. It has been a week since what is probably the most consequential election in our lifetimes. If you are anything like me, I was sure that Vice President Harris was going to win, so when I saw that her opponent had won, I was disappointed, worried, scared, and even angry. As a member of the LGBTQ+ Community, I am



even angry. As a member of the LGBTQ+ Community, I am very concerned about the intentions of the Christian Nationalists and Project 2025; as an American, I am frightened of the prospect of losing our democracy and living under a dictatorship.

How did this happen? Knowing everything we do about the President Elect, how could we possibly have chosen him again? Speaking for myself, I did not choose him, and I suspect that most of the people reading this did not choose him either. So why were there so many people willing to give this person another chance to destroy our democracy? I think the answer is clear: the people have been lied to and far too many have believed those lies. Common sense would suggest that people should be able to tell the difference between truth and falsehoods, but that is obviously not the case.

We have become a society that no longer values education and critical thinking skills. Common sense is no longer common. Too many people think that if they see it on Facebook or Tik Tok or X or whatever platform they visit most often, then it must be true. As a teacher of English for over 35 years, I can say with great certainty that if a student of mine cited Tik Tok in a research paper, I would definitely have a problem with that and the student's grade would reflect that.

We need to stop downplaying the importance of education, critical thinking, and common sense. Schools should not be worried about indoctrination, censorship, sexualization of children, and wokeness (whatever people think that means); of course, we don't want those things to happen in our schools, and for the most part, they are not happening, but if enough people believe something is happening, then for them, it is really occurring in schools all over the United States. Most people are too lazy to check and see if these stories really are confirmed by strong, logical empirical data or are just rumors which spread like wildfire on the internet.

Please be very careful about what you pass along to your friends and family on social media. Stick to cute cat videos and goofy memes. I've spent my entire career trying to convince people that education is the greatest gift you can give yourself, and no one can ever take it away from you. Try to educate yourself and stay informed on what's really

going on in this world. It's the only chance we have to salvage our democracy.

Lamentation and Loneliness

So many people in this country see diversity as a strength and understand that a safety net for the most vulnerable is a sign of a caring nation. For such ideals, the election delivered difficult news. Many are in retreat, cursing the darkness, vowing to socially hibernate for the next four years. But this comes in the face of U.S. surgeon general, Vivek Murthy's 71-page advisory warning last year that America is in the midst of an 'epidemic of loneliness and isolation.' The study estimates that low levels of social connection affects more Americans than diabetes or obesity. This is not surprising for a nation where the average American will spend over four hours a day staring at their phone. What is the response from a religion that puts Love at the center?

FSAR's work on environmental protection and land preservation goes hand-in-hand with the human right to housing. Each new house built advances the culture and dignity of Indigenous communities in Honduras.


These family homes ensure more tightly knit communities, providing a sacred and shared space, inviting all to *Encuentro La Milpa*, or "enter the cornfield."

In the words of our partner, the land and homes are like a cornfield space "where the dreams of the family, of the community organization, are woven; where lived reality is addressed: problems and concerns, challenges, and hopes." *La Milpa* is "the people's struggle against extractive projects, against agroindustry, against invasive products. *La Milpa* means a political fight to make us people in freedom."

The 2024-25 UU Common Read is ready for you!

With this year's kit of Common Read resource materials, we are pleased and excited to invite Unitarian Universalists into conversation with transgender and nonbinary people—and their partners, parents, children, siblings, and chosen family members —whose interviews and portraits fill the Skinner House book, *Authentic Selves: Celebrating the Lives of Transgender and Nonbinary People and Their Families*.

The subjects of *Authentic Selves* share their own stories, speaking from different stages of life, different regions of the country, different faith traditions, and different places on the rainbow spectrum of gender identity. Their book invites readers into their lives' revelations, challenges, joys, and networks of support.



The team who created this resource kit included UU religious educators with personal life stories outside the gender binary. Working from the heart, we followed the lead of *Authentic Selves*, centering the voices and perspectives of trans and nonbinary people and their families in all the discussion materials. On the UU Common Read landing page, you'll find a Discussion Guide for a Mixed Group (all gender identities), a Cohort Discussion Guide (transgender and nonbinary participants only), a Youth Group Discussion Guide, and a Workshop for Parents and Caregivers who love and care for transgender and nonbinary children or youth.
