

Dear Sandra,

As some of you know by now, the City Council met last night to a packed house for the second reading and final vote on the ordinance to criminalize the unhoused. The ordinance, also known as the 'camping ban' ordinance, eliminates any area the unhoused can go in Fremont without being identified as a violation of the municipal code. You can read more about. Read what the SF Standard says about Fremont's ordinance.

There is a new moral ethos emerging in our country that not only dehumanizes 'the other' (the unhoused, the immigrant, LGBTQIA, the 'woke,' etc.), but who are eager to rewrite legislation, targeting those on the margins even further.

The city council chamber was packed with two overflow rooms. 194 people signed up to offer a 1 minute testimonial to the council, but there was only time for 80. I was one of those who got to speak.



I shared that MPUUC is committed to helping Fremont 'Love the Hate out of this world.' I shared the African proverb that says, 'People aren't homeless because they run out of money. People are homeless because they run out of relationships.' I shared theologian Gabriel Garcia Marquez's well known line, 'God holds a preferential option for the poor. 'This is not a financial decision,' I shared. 'It is a moral decision. And Fremont will reveal its moral position through this vote.

Sadly, at nearly midnight, the council pushed the vote through by a 6-1 margin. Many filed out of the meeting holding despair for where we've come. But not me. I do lament the decision and the radicalized way our citizenry is successfully being pitted against each other by politicians feeding public fear. But I have never been more proud of MPUUC for showing out and showing up in such a wholehearted way. There were a dozen of us in our purple shirts. Vice Mayor Desrie Campbell (the dissenting vote) cited MPUUC's

helpful stance. Our efforts brought us whole heartedly into 'a coalition of the caring.'

We are living out loud our values when they are called into question. We were noticed, understood, appreciated. People in Fremont are beginning to see there is a place they can go when their compassionate stance feels pushed out of city gripped by fear. The days ahead may be challenging, but the ways we're making sure Love shows up when it's needed is getting stronger every day.

#### January Share the Plate - Muwekma Ohlone Tribe Inc.

We will be collecting through February 23.

The Muwekma are a landless tribe whose families enrolled with the Bureau of Indian Affairs from 1928-1971 and attended Indian boarding schools in the 1930s-40s. Scattered throughout the Bay Area, they lacked communal spaces to preserve their traditions,

language, and dances, which spread to other communities during the 1870s. The tribe is now revitalizing their culture through workshops on language, songs, traditions, dances, regalia, native plant restoration, and cultivation. Our donations will support these efforts.
