

If you're anything like me, you can get overwhelmed by all this stuff. All those "what ifs" get in the way of being present in the moment, and for some of us, it can lead to depression. As a member of the LGBTQ+ community and a disabled person, this is a very real concern for me.

What a boring place this would be if we were all alike in every aspect of life, like race and religion, Part of the great gift of diversity is that we don't have to know everything about everything to live in this world. We each have different strengths, skills, interests, and talents, so it makes sense that working together with people whose knowledge complements yours is the best way to keep things from going off the rails. Of course, not everyone has enough sense or, for that matter, critical thinking skills, so it's no surprise that we have to deal with a lot of derailments in everyday life.

I certainly don't have all the answers to life's problems, nor do I have the right to tell you how to live your life. Part of what we are fighting now is not just political; it's

about our very ways of life, our uniqueness, and our gifts and talents. We all have to figure out for ourselves how to deal with the challenges of life, and I'm very sure we would fail if we were all alike. We must stand up to the bullies and billionaires who think they have the right to direct the rest of us to do their bidding. Money doesn't make them better or smarter than we are, and it's up to us to make this very clear to those who believe that they are superior to "regular" people. I don't know how to stop this runaway train, but I can continue to do what I need to do to keep things on track.

General Assembly (GA) is the annual meeting of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), where participants gather to worship, witness, learn, connect, and make policy decisions for the



Association through a democratic process. While anyone can attend, congregations must certify annually to have voting delegates.

General Assembly 2025

From June 18–22, 2025, the 64th UUA General Assembly will be a multi-platform event, with the main stage hosted at the Baltimore Convention Center in Baltimore, Maryland and hundreds more joining on the Whova app. Google map

Coming Soon: Children's Programs Registration

We encourage congregations to identify and register their delegates by March 31to lock in the lowest GA registration rate. Registrations are non-transferable, so be sure to register specific individuals early! This gives them access to financial aid, volunteer opportunities, and plenty of time to arrange travel and housing.

Congregations will be able to begin distributing member delegate credentials via the credentialing system in April.

The UUA Board of Trustees is working to engage delegates earlier than ever. Delegates can dive into the agenda, discuss amendments, and build consensus on the UUA discussion forum. Being prepared helps ensure a positive experience!

To support delegates, the Board will host online candidate forums and "What to Expect" webinars before GA. Business Mini-assemblies may take place in May or June. Election balloting will open on June 1.

Early registration is the key to staying informed and confident in this important role. Rates go up April 1—don't wait!


