Dear Sandra,

Hi Mission Peakers,

I'm still feeling excited after Saturday's "Hands Off" rally in downtown Fremont. Our rally was estimated to be 1,000people strong, stretching almost from Mowry to Walnut and beyond along Paseo Padre. Over a dozen members of MPUUC were there, many in purple t-shirts. It was a delight to share our values with each other and with others. All the folks I spoke with were friendly and glad to talk about their values and their concerns, including their anger about the way our country has been going in the past few months and



their fears about what is ahead. In Fremont, and in so many places (one report estimated there were 1,100 protests around the world – yes, not just in the U.S.!), people carried lots and lots of unique, handmade signs. We were encouraged on social media to complete the phrase "Hands Off" with whatever we chose. I saw Hands Off Social Security, Hands Off My Body, Hands Off Trans Kids and many more; I carried "Hands Off Democracy."

The Hands Off rally made me think of the "Women's March" (which included lots of non-women folks too) the day after Trump's first inauguration in 2016. I marched in Oakland that day, along with many thousands. I felt so touched and pleased and grateful that there were crowds of others who wanted to show that they were not at all in agreement with what was happening in our country. I felt surrounded by kindred souls, all engaging with each other, all sharing both happiness and anger. I texted on and off all day with friends in New York City, San Francisco and Madison, WI who were marching in solidarity in their cities too. This was big. And connecting with them and comparing the best signs we had seen made me feel connected with an even larger group of Americans. We were all in this together. The awful administration would not make us lie down and give up.

Protests are about communicating dissatisfaction and convincing others to consider why all these average people want to spend a pretty Saturday yelling together and waving at cars going by. But maybe the most important reason for protests is connection with other participants. I certainly felt buoyed last weekend by seeing the crowds and their expressions of what the country needs to get rid of and what we need instead. I think that good feeling of connecting with people there will give me an extra nudge of confidence the next time I'm considering rallying again, or volunteering for a cause, or going to a meeting that might help make a difference in the world, or speaking up, not avoiding, civil talks with family and friends who don't agree with me. We all need to keep giving each other those little nudges.

Action Sunday

Bryon Stevenson and other activists working to end oppression say that the most effective way to address any particular type of oppression - whether it is racial prejudice or bias against LGBTQIA persons, or immigrants - is through proximity. In other words, when we actually spend time with them. When we know their story, it becomes much harder to look the other way, or dismiss them, or put them in a box. This Action Sunday, we will be working with people who have experienced being homeless who will tell their story. They will come to us and we will go to them. And with this, we will not have to ask, 'Who is our neighbor?'

5. Join with those who will be helping to prepare the garden to grow food (some of which may benefit our unhoused neighbors.

This is a busy Sunday. Come prepared to put your good will to work.

Interested in pitching in? We'd love to have your help! Please dress for the task and weather - hat, work gloves, and appropriate shoes. (Jen and I will bring a cooler of drinks - gatorade and such.) Also, please email me (<u>hmsbrian@gmail.com</u>) if you have tools to bring to make this easier -shovels, rakes, grass shears? Weed cutters? As mentioned, we're amateurs at this.

To be clear: we won't plant anything on 4/13 - we'll schedule that for another day, likely 4/27 or 5/4. (And of course, we don't have to plant everything at once.) There are some beautiful poppies growing there, should you want to bring a pot or something and take some home.


SABBATICAL

Board Briefs

Board briefs from February 18, 2025 MPUUC Board meeting.

The Board met on February 18, 2025

• MPUUC has taken action to support unhoused residents in Fremont in various ways including, written and spoken opposition to the City of

Fremont's proposed "Camping Ban" Ordinance (FMC Section 8.90), joined a community coalition "Coalition of the Caring" with Fremont For Everyone and other community faith groups and non-profit organizations, called a Congregational Meeting to vote on whether to become a plaintiff in a civil rights lawsuit against the City of Fremont for its proposed Ordinance.

- DeAnna Alm is the Canvass Chair. Canvass (our pledge process) begins March 9 with a lunch at Cole Hall and a virtual Potluck on Monday, March 10 for Zooming members. The Treasurer uses Pledge information to create the Annual Budget that is voted on at the June 8th Annual Meeting.
- The Board is investigating one of its Restricted Funds, the Building Fund, to determine donors and a possible amendment to its purpose. If MPUUC members are interested contact Valerie Stewart at Valeriempuuc@gmail.com.
- The Board has entered into negotiations with Rev. Jim McKinley to serve as its Sabbatical Minister later this year from October to December, when Rev. Ward is on Sabbatical.
- The Board is looking for Members who would like to attend General Assembly -June 18-22- as a Delegate (it is possible to attend virtually). Contact President Beth Schaefer if you are interested.


The next board meeting will be via Zoom on Tuesday, April 15, 2025 at 7 pm.
