On Saturday May 10th, eight of us from MPUUC met with Carmen Barsody and the Faithful Fools for a 'street retreat' in the Tenderloin neighborhood of San Francisco. After nearly 4 hours walking the streets, our stories revealed epiphanies and awakenings. None of us were able to supernaturally end the suffering we encountered. Nonetheless, many of us were transformed, simply by choosing to be present to the people and their challenges rather than our own fear. Here are a few snippets from those in attendance. Rev Barbara: For me, I found meaning in the connections made and strengthened.

Kathi: I saw that people are people. They care about the people in their community, and they are usually doing their best. Most people just need understanding and the help that communities have always given each other.

Terri: It was a sparklingly gorgeous day in San Francisco. And the juxtaposition of that great beauty with the conditions and struggles of the people who live on the street - well, it was heartbreaking.

Beth: The street retreat underlined for me how important it is for everyone — no matter where or how they live — to have relationships with friends and family and neighbors.

Kate Amon: It was an honor to be a Fool that day. My desire to be one of the helpers, as Mr Rogers describes, was reconfirmed.

Jay: I was inspired by volunteers and organizations working to give a hand up to folks run down by circumstance. The organizations such as Glide Memorial Church and St. Anthony's were inspiring with their commitment to help others, and seeing their enthusiastic volunteers helping others brought a great joy.

Greg: It was enough to significantly change the way I see people living on the street - and the many human things that connect me to them.

Ariel: This experience really changed the way I look at the people in my own neighborhood- I now have a much larger sense of the people I could and should call neighbors.



A Stroke of Insight

Dr. Jill Bolte Taylor is a Harvard-trained neuro anatomist. In 1996 she experienced a severe hemorrhage (AVM) in the left hemisphere of her



brain causing her to lose the ability to walk, talk, read, write, or recall any of her life. She put what she learned from that experience in her book, My Stroke of Insight. It spent 63 weeks on the New York Times nonfiction bestseller list. In this service, we will explore how what she learned can help UUs find their place in this changing world.

Rev. Greg Ward will lead the service and assisting will be Worship Associate Chris Cook. Melissa Holmes will be Worship Host. Peak Rocks will provide our music.


2025 Biennial Assessment

MPUUC Community Garden

The MPUUC Community Garden beds are now ready for planting, and we probably should get some veggies in the ground right away. We have two beds on the north side, one on the south, and a long bed on the east.

This is not only a tremendous opportunity to infuse beauty and purpose to our campus, but to potentially provide food for lunch and learns as well as local residents of shelters and encampments who don't often get healthy fresh produce.

Beds Chapman, Adames, and Yaz are each divided into three 4-ft sections. The Lee bed - the one in "center field," like its namesake J.H. Lee - is sectioned into three 8-ft spaces. A dozen sections in all.

For now, I think we just need to see how much of the space folks want to plant. (Also, signing up for multiple sections is fine by me.)



Grateful for this statement from the Unitarian Universalist Association

"Let us say it unequivocally and without hesitation: affirming the inherent worthiness and belovedness of transgender people is an expression of our Unitarian Universalist faith. The safety and well-being of trans and nonbinary beloveds is not someone else's work, it is ours: both those of us whose gender identity makes us most acutely vulnerable and those of us to whom allyship is central to our being. We are all part of one family. We are parents, children, siblings, chosen kindred, and we are one another's people.

In these days of mounting white Christian nationalism, people and policymakers have come to expect religion to be on the side of fear. Faith has been co-opted and twisted into a tool of control. We will not cede moral authority to those who would use it as a weapon. It is our responsibility as people of faith to use our voices and wield our values as a shield between the powerful and those being scapegoated and threatened. It is our responsibility

as people of faith to speak the truth in fierce, unshakable love."
