Dear Sandra,

Like many of you, I've been very worried about what's going on in this country – and the world. When a respected senator is slammed to the ground by federal agents and when the comptroller and mayoral candidate of the largest city in the U.S. is arrested by plainclothes ICE agents, we are no longer a civil society, much less a democracy. Scapegoating and ruthless violence has got to stop.

I know I'm not saying anything that's not completely obvious. But the response I'm recommending may not be the first thing that comes to mind. I'm proposing a three part strategy that's counter intuitive.

First, show up - especially for those people who are being targeted for hostility. I believe that living into our Unitarian



Universalism can be a revolutionary response to challenging times. If more people who were the recipients of this administration's irrational hate were to consider Cole Hall a second home, I am confident they would be better off (and we would be better for helping them). That said, such people are not going to find us on their own. The number one reason why people would consider reaching out to us is because we reached out to them first. And we became as well known for kindness as the current administration is becoming known for hate.

Second, be kind. Although reading almost anything in the news – especially about the current administration – may make contempt, disdain and doubt look fashionable, it does not cultivate creativity, leadership or happiness in the same way that making the intentional choice to be kind will do.

And finally, dare to hope. We need hope. Not only is it necessary for building a better world, but it's necessary for staying sane. It's helpful for me when I remember to think of hope as NOT an evidence-based response. But, rather, as a revolutionary and disorienting tactic that confounds and frustrates haters. Think of hope as a virtue that we choose not because it's obvious or inevitable; but because it is what's needed for good to

prevail. Good people do it to make what's needed more possible.

For the next seven weeks, I'll be away seeking ways I can show up, be kind and cultivate hope. I will miss you and pray that you all take care of each other. And I'll look forward to returning and figuring out how we can work together to take care of the world that needs us.

MPUUC Community Garden

The MPUUC Community Garden beds are now ready for planting, and we probably should get some veggies in the ground right away. We have two beds on the north side, one on the south, and a long bed on the east.

This is not only a tremendous opportunity to infuse beauty and purpose to our campus, but to potentially provide food for lunch and learns as well as local residents of shelters and encampments who don't often get healthy fresh produce.

Beds Chapman, Adames, and Yaz are each divided into three 4-ft sections. The Lee bed - the one in "center field," like its namesake J.H. Lee - is sectioned into three 8-ft spaces. A dozen sections in all.

Now it's time to sign up and get some plants going! I've made a <u>sign up sheet here</u>, and have attached a sketch. Oh, and ignore the Tasks column in the sign up... I'll update that as needed. For now, I think we just need to see how much of the space folks want to plant. (Also, signing up for multiple sections is fine by me.)
