Your Search Team (Kathi Bayne, Beth Schaefer, Lucienne Bouvier, Mark Rahman) has been very busy these last few weeks. We have been tasked with finding just the perfect minister. And now we are asking you to do a lot in return. In the next couple of weeks, there are several congregational meetings. The first will be a Congregational Conversation. We are hoping to use this time to



get feedback from the congregation on the story that we will present to prospective ministers. Because we may not be able to attract what some might consider the "best" minister, we really need to make sure we get the best fit for a minister. We have to have the most accurate and full information about the congregation that we can get. From what individuals feel to what the congregation as a living, breathing soulful entity feels.

The search committee will put out a survey either today or tomorrow that we hope will provide that perfect information. In as much as no survey is perfect, we are hoping also that at the meeting and at any other time you can do so, please contact a member of the search committee to let us know of anything you think we might have left out. Because the fit between minister and congregation is so important, we are really hungry for all of the best and most accurate information possible. This is your contribution to your own future. We are all in this together.

On November 2, the congregational meeting is to find out what the congregation wants in the way of duration for the term of hire. The meeting will be hybrid. We are hoping for as many people attending as is practical. We are further hoping that the congregation will be able to consider where we stand in terms of the range of pay and benefits that we may offer. We will need the congregation's decision because our bylaws do not address the specific situation we find ourselves in. Therefore, it is best to avoid confusion in the future by knowing best how we shall proceed from here. Clear guidance will illuminate the path most splendidly. We have far yet to travel and will rely on our community to provide courage and resolve. Enjoy life and be well.

October Share the Plate - Equal Justice Initiative



Reparations Bills Signed by Governor Newsom

Gov. Newsom signed two reparations bills, SB 437 requiring the CSU to explore options to determine how to confirm an individual's status as a descendant, and SB 518 creating the Bureau for Descendants of



American Slavery. Nearly **8,600** letters were sent to Governor Newsom in support of the reparations bills. The Governor also vetoed AB 57 related to the Home Purchase Assistance Program for descendants of formerly enslaved people, and AB 62 related to the Civil Rights Department and applications from persons dispossessed of property taken as a result of racially motivated eminent domain. Don Tamaki, who spoke to MPUUC about his work on California reparations, asks us not to be fooled by media coverage focusing only on the vetoes. The governor's signing of SB 437 and SB 518 are *historic first steps* in the legislative process. Board Briefs

October 2025 BOARD BRIEFS

1.Ministerial Search

After participating in a meeting on 9/25/2025 with Christine Purcell, UUA Congregational Transitions Director, the Board voted to Approve the 2025-2026 Ministerial Search Committee members; Kathi Bayne, Lucienne Bouvier (UUA Liaison), Mark Rahman, Beth Schaefer (Chair).



A draft Charter, with timeline and tasks, including organizing a survey for the Congregation, was sent to Search Committee for review and input at their meeting on Oct. 17, after which they will refer Charter back to the Board, and with the Committee input the Board will take a digital vote to approve the Charter.

Board President will complete the UUA online form to initiate the Contract Minister search profile in the MinistrySearch System (the UUA on-line portal) with Search Committee information. Because the new category of "Contract Minister" is not directly described in our bylaws, the Board concluded we need a congregational vote to agree on the period for a contract minister and to clarify the Board's authority.

The Board calls a Congregational Meeting NOVEMBER 2

2. Sabbatical Ministry

Rev. Jim McKinley has begun his term with MPUUC. He is at Services most Sundays and is a joy to have with us. Dec. 7th will be his last Sunday Service with MPUUC. Sunday with Rev. Mckinley in pulpit - Oct 26 /Nov. 9 /Nov. 23/ Dec. 7).

3. Financial actions

A new account was established (#319) for Music Discretionary, added \$1000 which permits funding of a new electronic keyboard and stand. These funds resulted from the summer collections.

Additional funds received have reduced the projected budget deficit (at this time) to \$11,300. These include \$825 from members for prior year pledge received in this fiscal year, \$3,500 in memory donations received in June 2025, which are going to our Operating budget.

Treasurer and President are still in process of transferring signatures on various bank/credit union accounts.

4. The Black and White Auction – November 22, 2025

This fabulous Team of John Schaefer, July Ganzlin, who are returning to lead the

newcomers -David Johnson, Emily Hessenauer and Beth Schaefer are hard at work. The Black & White will be hybrid, with an in-person event starting at 5:30 in Cole Hall and the bidding will be online from 6:30-8:00 pm.

5. Community Minister Barbara Meyers

Rev. Meyers offered two quarterly reports. She continues her work as Asst. Director of Life Reaching Across to Life counseling services, which may face Measure 2 funding issues. Her UUA activities include: Mental Health Network – which included a GA workshop on Companionship and NAMI resources/ online LGBTQ support group starting /UUA Addictions Ministry / UUA Accessibility Group. Publication of her next bookaddressing Disability is on the horizon, Skinner House has sent draft of the book. At MPUUC she is a member ARO/ Encourage Comm./COM. She offered a Recommended reading: Loretta Ross – Calling In, How to Start Making Change with Those you'd Rather Cancel

The next meeting of the board is via Zoom, Tuesday, November 11, at 7:00 p.m. All are welcome.
