Creation of the Profile shall begin as soon as the authorization is given. Our goal is to be done with the draft in two weeks and be sent off to the UUA department that helps with ministerial search. We need to give them extra time as something called Thanksgiving comes in the middle of their time. Upon critique from that quarter, we shall reedit and be ready to put it out live on December 2. At which time our work is done (not). I thank everyone for helping us on our way in many different ways. Be well, take excellent care of yourselves and know we love you.

Isaac Newton the Theologian

It is not generally known that Newton spent much time studying the Bible and formulating theological concepts. He developed an essentially unitarian concept of God and elucidated how the Bible had received small additions to support trinitarianism. But, even more profound was the effect of his science



on religion. He dispelled the concept that the sky could be the religious heaven by providing laws of nature which apply equally to earth and the heavens. This is an example of how our search for truth may have unexpected consequences for our spiritual life.

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING NOVEMBER 2, 2025 - after Sunday Service

Dear Fellow Congregation Members,

The Board notifies you of a **CONGREGATIONAL Meeting** on **November 2, 2025**, after the Sunday Service.



To: The Mission Peak Congregation From: The Mission Peak Board

We at Mission Peak UU Congregation find ourselves in the situation where we need to hire a minister for the 2026-27 church year. Rev. Greg Ward is retiring at the end of June 2026. The Board has called a Congregational Meeting for November 2, 2025, after the morning Service. The Board seeks the Congregation's authorization to hire a **Contract Minister** to meet our immediate need. This action does not require a change in the MPUUC Bylaws; however, the Board seeks the explicit authorization from the Congregation for the Board to determine procedures for and execute the hiring of a Contract Minister.

WHAT IS THE QUESTION:

The Board is asking you to vote "Yes" or "No" on this statement:

We, the Mission Peak Unitarian Universalist Congregation, authorize the Board to undertake the hire of a Contract Minister for a period not to exceed three years.

WHY:

The MPUUC Board recommends using the "Contract Minister" search because we believe that it is most in line with the needs and the operation of Mission Peak. MPUUC was founded with bylaws in 1994 at a time when the UUA recognized two types of ministry – "called" and "interim" and those two types of ministry are addressed in our bylaws. The UUA has modified its categories of ministry and provided guidance to ministers and congregations in the last few years, including as recently as September 2025. There is still a category of "called" ministry and now there is the category of "transitional ministry" (basically anything that is not "called"), which contains several types of ministries. Those categories include "interim"; however, after the Ministerial Search Task Force and Search Team have studied the new UUA guidance and consulted with the UUA Congregational Transitions Director, Christine Purcell, we believe a "Contract Minister" search is most in line with the needs and the operation of MPUUC.

Contract ministry is the most flexible category. Congregations with fewer than 125 members and those with part-time ministry positions use the contract ministry search process because of its flexibility and simplicity. When a congregation is unsure about ministry and/or how much of it they need or can sustain financially, a congregation may contract with a minister for a year or more, with the option to renew as the contract ends. A contract minister may be called after a couple of years of ministry partnership, if there is a desire to do this which is shared by the minister and the congregation.

CONCLUSION:

The Board of MPUUC believes that a Contract Minister position best meets the

upcoming needs of the Congregation and seeks explicit authority from the Congregation to engage in the hiring process for a Contract Minister.

Congregational votes require a quorum. Please plan to stay in-person or on Zoom for the meeting. If you are unable to attend in-person or on Zoom and request an ABSENTEE BALLOT, you must request your ballot by 6 pm Friday Oct. 31. YOU MUST RETURN YOUR BALLOT BY 6PM NOV. 1, Saturday, to be counted. Send your ballot request to SECRETARY@mpuuc.org.

Reparations Bills Signed by Governor Newsom

Gov. Newsom signed two reparations bills, SB 437 requiring the CSU to explore options to determine how to confirm an individual's status as a descendant, and SB 518 creating the Bureau for Descendants of



American Slavery. Nearly **8,600** letters were sent to Governor Newsom in support of the reparations bills. The Governor also vetoed AB 57 related to the Home Purchase Assistance Program for descendants of formerly enslaved people, and AB 62 related to the Civil Rights Department and applications from persons dispossessed of property taken as a result of racially motivated eminent domain. Don Tamaki, who spoke to MPUUC about his work on California reparations, asks us not to be fooled by media coverage focusing only on the vetoes. The governor's signing of SB 437 and SB 518 are *historic first steps* in the legislative process. Board Briefs

October 2025 BOARD BRIEFS

1.Ministerial Search

After participating in a meeting on 9/25/2025 with Christine Purcell, UUA Congregational Transitions Director, the Board voted to Approve the 2025-2026 Ministerial Search Committee members; Kathi Bayne, Lucienne Bouvier (UUA Liaison), Mark Rahman, Beth Schaefer (Chair).



A draft Charter, with timeline and tasks, including organizing a survey for the Congregation, was sent to Search Committee for review and input at their meeting on Oct. 17, after which they will refer Charter back to the Board, and with the Committee input the Board will take a digital vote to approve the Charter.

Board President will complete the UUA online form to initiate the Contract Minister search profile in the MinistrySearch System (the UUA on-line portal) with Search Committee information. Because the new category of "Contract Minister" is not directly described in our bylaws, the Board concluded we need a congregational vote to agree on the period for a contract minister and to clarify the Board's authority.

2. Sabbatical Ministry

Rev. Jim McKinley has begun his term with MPUUC. He is at Services most Sundays and is a joy to have with us. Dec. 7th will be his last Sunday Service with MPUUC. Sunday with Rev. Mckinley in pulpit - Oct 26 /Nov. 9 /Nov. 23/ Dec. 7).

3. Financial actions

A new account was established (#319) for Music Discretionary, added \$1000 which permits funding of a new electronic keyboard and stand. These funds resulted from the summer collections.

Additional funds received have reduced the projected budget deficit (at this time) to \$11,300. These include \$825 from members for prior year pledge received in this fiscal year, \$3,500 in memory donations received in June 2025, which are going to our Operating budget.

Treasurer and President are still in process of transferring signatures on various bank/credit union accounts.

4. The Black and White Auction – November 22, 2025

This fabulous Team of John Schaefer, July Ganzlin, who are returning to lead the newcomers -David Johnson, Emily Hessenauer and Beth Schaefer are hard at work. The Black & White will be hybrid, with an in-person event starting at 5:30 in Cole Hall and the bidding will be online from 6:30-8:00 pm.

5. Community Minister Barbara Meyers

Rev. Meyers offered two quarterly reports. She continues her work as Asst. Director of Life Reaching Across to Life counseling services, which may face Measure 2 funding issues. Her UUA activities include: Mental Health Network – which included a GA workshop on Companionship and NAMI resources/ online LGBTQ support group starting /UUA Addictions Ministry / UUA Accessibility Group. Publication of her next bookaddressing Disability is on the horizon, Skinner House has sent draft of the book. At MPUUC she is a member ARO/ Encourage Comm./COM. She offered a Recommended reading: Loretta Ross – Calling In, How to Start Making Change with Those you'd Rather Cancel

The next meeting of the board is via Zoom, Tuesday, November 11, at 7:00 p.m. All are welcome.
