Greetings!

Hello Dear Members and Friends of Our Beloved Community,

On MLK Jr. Day, after our community event at Cole Hall, I drove to Hayward to participate in their annual MLK Jr Day of Celebration. The keynote speaker was retired Santa Clara County Superior Court Judge

LaDoris Cordell, a long-time professional friend. Judge Cordell was the first African American woman on the state bench in Northern California back in 1982, which is when we first met. I love to hear LaDoris speak- she is smart, witty, thoughtful and an excellent "speaker"; she knows how to construct her presentation and hold the attention of every audience to whom she speaks- if you see her speaking somewhere, I recommend you attend. At the MLK Jr celebration LaDoris spoke of many of the challenges and accomplishments of the Civil Rights Movement and those who participated in and lead it. From her mentors she learned that there was an eleventh commandment – "Thou Shall Not be Indifferent"- and she has incorporated that into her way of living. Those words resonated with me and seemed to create a micro-description of being a UU. Because we value the interconnected web of all that is our universe, our existence and one another, we can't be indifferent when we see injustice.



There is plenty of injustice at the moment. "Move fast and break things" is a strategy to prevent an opposition from forming to the multitude of ways that our democracy is under attack from the current federal administration. But what is hopeful is that people are forming loud opposition, even at the cost of their own lives. Living in California we are spared some of the conservative actions -so far- that exist in other states, but we cannot "be indifferent" or our freedoms here will also be at risk. I recently became aware of a bill (Safer Communities Through Opportunities) in the California Assembly that would provide more options for diversion for defendants in non-violent cases. The organizations that support AB 1231 reads like a laundry list of groups we all support, but the opposition from law enforcement groups is strong, even though research demonstrates that diversion from the prison system and making restitution to a victim – restorative justice- is far less expensive to our society. Yes, we have much on our MPUUC plates - supporting solutions for our unhoused neighbors, Canvass is coming up, we are "in search" for a minister for our

next church year and will have much “transitioning” to do when Rev. Greg leaves, but we can’t become overwhelmed – we are a community of “Caring Hearts and Open Minds” and from being “in community” we can take strength and not be indifferent to opportunities to make our world a kinder, better, softer place for all in our inner-connected web. Together we are better.

February 7 is National Black HIV/AIDS Awareness Day (NBHAAD)

National Black HIV/AIDS Awareness Day (NBHAAD) is dedicated to raising awareness about the disproportionate impact of HIV on Black and African American communities. First observed in 1999, NBHAAD highlights the importance of community involvement and improved access to HIV education, prevention, testing, and treatment services. This year's theme is "Engage, Educate, Empower: Uniting to End HIV/AIDS in Black Communities."

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), national HIV prevention efforts led to a 10 percent decrease in the number of Black or African American people diagnosed with HIV between 2017 and 2021

Tell Congress: No Secret Police

– Demand that Congress block the unchecked growth of ICE and put an end to Donald Trump's secret police force. ICE now has a bigger budget than the militaries of most countries—and it's being used to target, detain, and terrorize our communities, not keep us safe. This agency has arrested elected officials, disappeared people off the street, and torn families apart. That's not law enforcement—that's authoritarianism. Add your name to demand an end to ICE's abuse of power and reign of terror.

Call Congress:

Stop Starving Gaza and Block the Bombs – The Israeli military has been killing Palestinians on a daily basis, restricting aid, and delaying the reopening of the Rafah crossing—the most critical lifeline for entry and exit from Gaza. This winter, seven Palestinian children have died from freezing temperatures due to the Israeli military occupation's blockade of critical aid. As Israel's largest military funder, the U.S. has the power to ensure humanitarian aid access and end the killing. Take action now by telling your members of Congress to advocate for the immediate reopening of Rafah crossing, for all aid to enter Gaza, and to pass the Block the Bombs Act (H.R. 3565) to stop arming Israel.

Board Briefs

The Board met on January 13, 2026. Trustee At Large Michelle Wallace was absent due to health matters. The next Board Meeting is scheduled February 10th at 7:00 pm. All are welcome to attend. Meetings are by Zoom. Contact Secretary@MPUUC.org for the link.

1. The Board affirmed an earlier electronic vote to approve Jennifer Culp to be the Canvass Co-Chair with Chair DeAnna Alm. The Canvass Committee will be working with the Treasurer who will draw up an estimated budget for the coming year. The estimate at this time is that MPUUC will need to increase pledges by 15% over this year.
2. Rev. Greg will be holding a "Worship Summit" on January 24 with all those in the congregation who participate in creating Sunday Services. The goal is to establish lines of responsibilities and re-distribute tasks in anticipation of his retirement and a new minister onboarding with MPUUC.
3. The Sunday Service on January 25 will be conducted by Guest Minister, Rev. Jay Atkinson.
4. The Search Team reported that as of the meeting date five individuals have submitted applications, representing a variety of ages, cultures and ministerial experience from 0-12 years. The closing date is February 2. When all applications are received the Search Team will begin to schedule Zoom meetings with the applicants. They are currently consulting with various sources to develop questions and role-playing in practice interviews. The Team wants to base their assessment on the quality of what the candidate can bring to MPUUC, not merely compare one candidate to another.
5. The Board reviewed the existing Board Policies as required by the Bylaws, a new Sec. 19 was approved to describe the "Rites of Passage" services that MPUUC members are entitled to, other minor corrections were approved. The updated version of the Policies will be uploaded to the website within the month.
6. We are still exploring the options to install a ramp on the cancel in Cole Hall to make the raised platform more accessible. Any design and installation must be approved by FUMC. Jay Steele created an excellent presentation and Valerie Stewart will discuss it with the FUMC Board.



7. The MLK Day of Service project planned by MGCB Director Ariel Smith-Iyer was approved to accept donations to help cover costs. Everyone expressed their appreciation for the excellent effort by Ariel in organizing the project, creating a "public-facing" project to involve MPUUC with the larger community.
8. MPUUC is undergoing the annual UUA Certification process which must be completed by February 2, with reports to the UUA. Our Office Administrator Sandra Lange, President Jay Steele and Membership Committee will coordinate to complete the report.
